Regional Victoria enters lockdown from 1.00pm Saturday 21 August

VIC COVID-19 ALERT

Due to the ongoing level of community transmission, the large number of mystery cases and a surge of new cases and exposures sites outside of metropolitan Melbourne, regional Victoria entered lockdown from 1.00pm on Saturday 21 August 2021. Victoria's Chief Health Officer has declared that all metropolitan Melbourne restrictions – except for the curfew – will be implemented across regional Victoria from 1.00pm on Saturday 21 August until 11.59pm Thursday 2 September 2021.

Additionally, further measures will be implemented to protect children across the entire state, as the number of infections amongst kids continues to rise.

This means that in regional Victoria there will be only five reasons to leave your home:

- to get the food and the supplies you need
- to exercise for up to two hours no more than 5km from your home
- for care or caregiving
- authorised work or education if you can't do it from home
- or to get vaccinated at the nearest possible location.

Face masks will still be mandatory outdoors and indoors (not at home) unless an exception applies – this includes all workplaces, and secondary schools. To give industry time to adjust, workforce permits will be required to leave the house for authorised work from 11.59pm on Monday 23 August 2021.

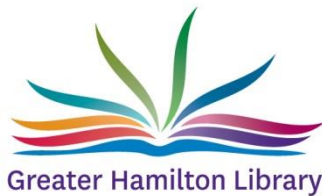

It happened when Jeanine and I were out trying to spot those pesky, elusive whales from Logans beach in Warrnambool. We haven't had a lot of luck in spotting these magnificent creatures; in fact we have never spotted any at all.

As we were leaving something happened that was as significant as a whale breaching. We were about to step into the car park and a toddler made to run past us into the car park. His mother cried out with understandable gusto, "Billy! No further!"

Billy did as he was told and halted at the edge of the car park although he did turn and face his mum with a cheeky grin, knowing that he had drawn the desired response from her.

It wasn't until much later that I thought about this little encounter. I was on a stretch of open road with not another car in sight. It was a pleasant sunny day and the horses under the hood were champing at the bit. The temptation...But fortunately I thought about Mum's words. 'No further'. There was a very good reason for the words that she wailed and the passion in her voice. Her words were exhaled in order to protect her son. Billy of course had no idea of the inherent dangers of rushing out to flirt with motor vehicles. How could he have any understanding at such a tender age? And it's easy to say it's 'a baby lesson,' but it is a lesson for all of us every time we think we might chance a law that we don't understand or believe that it doesn't apply to us. I thought about that Mum as I set the cruise control. Ultimately, she was not just protecting drivers from unspeakable trauma, but she spoke out of love for her son.

These outcomes aim to promote and support healthy lifestyles, and to also enhance the liveability of the region for Southern Grampians residents now and into the future, through a community and partnership approach.

Southern Grampians Mayor Cr Bruach Colliton said Council has a significant role to play in contributing to and maintaining the health and liveability of the people of the Southern Grampians shire.

"The proposed Community Public Health and Wellbeing Plan has been developed via extensive and active community engagement and we thank our community members for their valuable feedback and their honesty," said Cr Colliton.

"We know that health and wellbeing is a whole-of-community responsibility and Council has the opportunity to show leadership and provide much needed support, working alongside our partner organisations to combine and maximise our efforts.

"We are committed to implementing the Plan to ensure the benefits are realised by all who live in and enjoy our

community now and into the future. We encourage everyone to have a read through the document and provide feedback on the proposed priorities for action,” Cr Colliton concluded.

Outcomes outlined in The Plan to support community health include provision for mental health services, access to nutritious food, support for social connectivity and connection to culture, to reduce harm caused by gambling, drugs and alcohol and to enable residents to remain physically active at all life stages.

Outcomes developed to contribute to a liveable Southern Grampians community include ensuring residents have access to everyday needs, growing the economy, meet housing needs, provide access to technology and public spaces, and to encourage sustainable practices that promote a healthy environment.

Tell me... what did you learn?

I can't have been any more than 12 years old. My dad had bought fish and chips at Warracknabeal. By the time he got back to Sheep Hills this gastronomic delight had cooled slightly.

“Here David. Pop these in the oven as a treat for dinner.” I was stoked. We hardly ever got fish and chips and McDonalds hadn't quite made it to Sheep hills. I dutifully did as I was told; then got really excited and really hungry. Until... an acrid aroma began to fill the kitchen. Something wasn't quite right. A little wisp of smoke hung in the air. My father, looking more than a little puzzled, strode purposefully toward the oven.

Opening the oven, even more smoke came out and my father said a rude word that I had never heard before. Well... actually, it was probably more than one word. Little shapes of orange blistered the shiny white paper. Of course I had done the right thing and put the precious bundle, paper and all, straight into the oven. Perhaps I should have taken the paper off first? I mean... I guess that would have made sense right? But I was only very tender of years and this was my first foray into gourmet cooking. My father's emotions went from surprise, to horror, to anger, to befuddlement, to amusement, to disbelief and then the cycle was quickly repeated... several times.

I don't remember if the fish and chips were OK and whether we got to eat them. What I do remember was a conversation that began with... “Well David... what did you learn?” So next time you make a mistake, instead of lashing yourself mercilessly and endlessly, you might instead ask yourself. “What did I learn?”

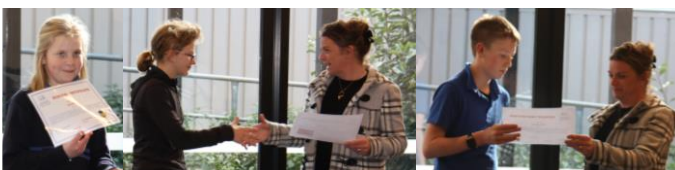

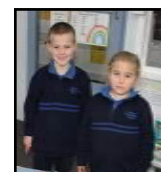

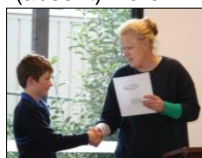
Hockey 7's Competition

He then gave me an example of a man coming from Koroit to see him one February whilst he was still at the Peshurst Hospital. Doug examined him and broke the news to him that he only had two weeks to live. Doug said, "I'm sorry, but I can really only say two weeks." The man thought for a while then said, "That's okay Doc, I'm a sporting man, I'll take the first week of May for the Warrnambool Races, and the last week in September because Koroit has been recruiting pretty well and should do all right this year."

Vietnam Veterans Day: Wednesday 18 August marked the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan. On this day in 1966, in a rubber plantation near the village of Long Tan, Australian soldiers fought one of their fiercest battles of the Vietnam War.

This battle saw D Company, 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment, face an enemy force of over 2000. Heavily outnumbered, D Company held fast for 4 hours, supported by accurate artillery fire from Nui Dat, before reinforcements arrived. The battle saw 18 killed, and was the largest loss of life on a single day for the Australians.

In 1969, D Company returned to Long Tan to erect a memorial cross and commemorate the battle. Over time, this day became synonymous with all those who served and died in the Vietnam War. In 1987, then Prime Minister Bob Hawke

made this official, announcing that Long Tan Day would now be known as Vietnam Veterans' Day.

We continue to honour the service and sacrifice of all Vietnam veterans on this day. Approximately 60,000 Australians served in the Vietnam War. Of these 3,000 were wounded, and 521 were killed.¹
