300 Words from Father David

Today's story begins at the Queen Vic market in Melbourne. It has a large veranda and sometimes they feed those who sleep rough there with a bottle of water and a BBQ.

Jeanine and I have stayed at an inexpensive but comfortable hotel just around the corner from all this so we know the area well and we know who and what to expect. It's not ritzy, it's not sexy and glamorous and pretty much every time I have to check myself, remind myself, that I have no idea what has led these people to their destitution, and I have no idea where and who they will be in 6 months time and what they will look like.

A mental illness, a case of abuse, the invisible scourge of PTSD.

The trouble is that every time I consciously or subconsciously dismiss one of these little ones, I not only do a disservice to them, but, just as appallingly, I discredit and diminish my own self and therefore all my brothers and sisters. Everybody loses.

In his book 'The promise' Arnold Dix captures this eloquently and succinctly in his own encounter.

"I once gave money to a beggar on the street in Melbourne. The person I was with scoffed, telling me I had probably just been scammed. That immediate dismissal of a perfect stranger doesn't sit well with me. Even considering that possibility gets in the way of the intention of my act to show someone a little kindness and some mercy.

Who cares if they spend that money on alcohol? Who cares if they don't need it as much as they have implied?

When we do not take each other at face value, when we discard people because they do not act or look like we think they should, we do a disservice to each other as human beings."

Treasure the invisible

Some time ago we had a working bee here at Christchurch Hamilton. The day was overcast and coolish but rugged up and looking like a bit of dag, I cheerfully joined in.

The aim was to smarten up the grounds, get rid of excess vegetation and show to the community that we take our care of the environment seriously, as well as offering a manicured 'welcome mat'. There were heady discussions around the logistics of what needed to be done, the right equipment and who would/could/should apply for these much sought after positions.

The skip filled easily and quickly. In fact there is probably another skip waiting in the next door departure lounge ready to go. The distraught and hapless flagpole was moved out of harm's way and plotting began for a slightly different version. It now looks very hospitable and you're always welcome to see what we accomplished.

It was leading into the footy finals so there was a bit of chatter about who might win and who might lose. Who had despaired of their team and whose heart had gone into arrhythmia with hope and excitement.

But there was something else that happened and while it was invisible, I sensed it most keenly when we all stopped for a well-earned cuppa and delectable home-made scone.

The sense of camaraderie and teamwork, cooperation and conviviality was almost palpable. Together we had achieved much, and the sense of pride blended with mirth and jocularity was just as enjoyable as looking over the well cared for and much loved grounds.

These invisible threads of companionship, encouragement and community are the deepest and sweetest treasures for me as a parish priest. They are not quantifiable, touchable or seeable, but it is these invisible things that I treasure most.

Engagements involving Australians

Since World War I, Australians have been called on many times to serve in wars, conflicts, and peace and humanitarian operations.

Almost 2 million people have worn with pride the uniforms of the Royal Australian Navy, Australian Army and Royal Australian Air Force.

Tragically, over 103,000 names are listed on the Roll of Honour at the Australian War Memorial. Those listed were members of the Australian armed forces who died during their service or afterwards as a result of war service:

- World War I
- World War II
- post-1945 conflicts, warlike service, non-warlike service and certain peace operations

Remembrance Day is a time for Australians to unite in solemn respect and remembrance for all those who died or suffered.

History of Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day was originally called 'Armistice Day', and 2 minutes of silence was observed for the first time at 11.00am on 11 November 1919 to remember those who had died.

Prime Minister Billy Hughes said at the time: Of their deeds it is not necessary for me to speak. Of their valour, endurance and resource at Gallipoli, Pozieres, Baupaume and other famous fields, men still speak with awe.

Hughes put our soldiers' sacrifice into perspective when he added:

Our heritage, our free institutions of government - all that we hold dear - are handed back into our keeping, stained with the blood of sacrifice. Surely not only we, their fellow citizens, but Australians throughout the ages, will treasure forever the memories of those glorious men to whom the Commonwealth owes so much, and will guard with resolute determination the privileges for which they fought and suffered.

After World War II, the Australian Government agreed to the United Kingdom's proposal to rename Armistice Day to 'Remembrance Day', to commemorate and remember those

who were killed in both World Wars. Today, we remember the loss of Australian lives from all wars and conflicts.

In 1918, Australia made a promise never to forget the service and sacrifice of 416,000 Australians who enlisted and over 60,000 who died. For over 100 years, we have kept this promise. We remember them still.¹

COUNCIL ADOPTS 10-YEAR ASSET PLAN TO GUIDE FUTURE INVESTMENT

Southern Grampians Shire Council adopted its Asset Plan 2025–2035, setting a clear direction for how the Shire's infrastructure will be managed, maintained and renewed over the next decade.

Developed in accordance with the *Local Government Act* 2020, the Plan outlines the condition, value and long-term needs of Council's roads, buildings, parks, drainage, bridges and other key community assets. It provides a transparent framework to ensure that future investment decisions are sustainable, data-driven and aligned with community priorities.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr Dennis Heslin called it a vital piece of Council's long-term planning framework.

"Our infrastructure is what allows us to make the most of our towns, from roads and footpaths to playgrounds, footy ovals and community centres," Cr Heslin said. "This Plan ensures we're managing those assets responsibly, planning for the future, and maintaining the high level of service and transparency our community expects."

The Asset Plan 2025–2035 aligns with Council's Community Vision, Council Plan 2025–2029, and Long-Term Financial Plan, ensuring a coordinated approach to planning and investment across all asset classes.

Community feedback played an important role in shaping the final document. The draft Plan was publicly exhibited between 19 September and 6 October 2025, with submissions helping to strengthen sections on playgrounds and sporting facilities and clarify the Plan's review cycle.

"We're grateful to everyone who took the time to provide feedback," Cr Heslin said. "Direct insight from the community helps us make sure our planning reflects local priorities and focuses on the assets that matter most." In recent years, Council has strengthened its asset knowledge through detailed road and footpath assessments and an updated Road Management Plan, helping to ensure the right investment decisions are made at the right time.

"This Plan reflects the progress we've made in improving asset management and provides a strong foundation for the future," said Cr Heslin. "By maintaining up to date data and a long-term focus, we can make the best use of every dollar invested in community infrastructure."

COUNCIL ADOPTS UPDATED AQUATIC CHILD SUPERVISION POLICY TO STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY SAFETY

Southern Grampians Shire Council has adopted a new Child Supervision Policy for all Council-operated outdoor swimming pools, highlighting its commitment to the safety of children, families and staff.

The updated policy, endorsed at the October Council Meeting, will take effect from the beginning of the 2025/26 Outdoor Pool Season. It replaces the *Watch Around Water* accreditation currently in place at outdoor pools, which will continue to apply at the Hamilton Indoor Leisure and Aquatic Centre (HILAC).

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the adoption of this policy enables a more efficient and effective response for all Council employed lifeguards, allowing Council to tailor the policy to meet service needs while ensuring the safety of all pool users and staff.

"The policy remains in alignment with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations (GSPO), which reference national industry standards that are enforced by state and local governments. It includes and extends on current Watch Around Water policies to provide increased clarity on facility entry for minors and education for large group entry."

The policy will remain unchanged for children five (5) years and under with no entry permitted without an appropriate parent or guardian (aged 16 or over) willing to swim with the child and remain within arm's reach.

Children aged 11 years and under will require active supervision by a parent or guardian while at the pool. This is an increase from the previous age limit of 10 years.

"Raising the supervision age reflects research showing that incidents often occur among children aged 0-14. Our goal is to reduce the risk to potential injuries and drowning in public aquatic facilities," Cr Heslin explained.

In line with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations to ensure safe supervision levels, groups / families will not be permitted entry where the number of Parent / Guardian's supervising a group of children under 10 years exceeds the ratio of 1:4. Larger informal groups of children arriving at an aquatic facility may also be required to participate in a short safety briefing to the entry policies and may be refused entry.

"This policy builds on the Watch Around Water policies with a view to reduce the number of youth related behavioural incidents encountered at all Council Outdoor Aquatic Facilities.

"Through implementation of this policy and associated actions staff will have clear age-related guidelines on facility entry for minors and education for large group entries," concluded Cr Heslin.

Council encourages all parents, guardians, and community groups to familiarise themselves with the new policy ahead of the upcoming pool season.

ANNUAL REPORT SHOWCASES YEAR OF PROGRESS FOR THE SOUTHERN GRAMPIANS

Southern Grampians Shire Council has tabled its 2024/25 Annual Report, highlighting strong progress across major projects, financial stability, and the continued delivery of services which support the region's communities.

Presented by Mayor Dennis Heslin at an Unscheduled Council Meeting on 22 October, the Annual Report provides a transparent account of Council's performance over the past financial year. The report also details progress towards the goals set out in the *Council Plan* 2021–2025.

Cr Heslin said the report captures the dedication of Council staff, community groups and partners working together to deliver positive outcomes for the whole Shire. "This past year has seen some truly transformative projects finally come to life, from the completion of the Melville Oval Redevelopment to new recreation facilities, gallery initiatives and support for local businesses and community groups,"

"These achievements demonstrate Council's ongoing commitment to strengthening our region through investment in infrastructure, creativity, sustainability and community wellbeing. Many of this year's biggest achievements were identified by members of the community through the budget submission process, which is fantastic outcome for those community groups."

The Annual Report tracks progress across Council's five key strategic objectives: Supporting our Community, Growing our Regional Economy, Maintaining and Renewing Infrastructure, Protecting our Natural Environment, and Providing Strong Governance and Leadership.

Highlights from 2024/25 include:

- Completion of the Melville Oval Redevelopment
- Installation of a new pump track at the Hamilton Skate Park
- Completed a full replacement of the stairs and viewing platform at Nigretta Falls
- Opening of the Hamilton Gallery's Creator Lab
- Launched the first Business Facade Improvement Program
- Distribution of \$300,000 in community grants to local groups
- Completion of the co-design phase for the new Hamilton Gallery
- Establishment of a CBD Streetscape Advisory Committee
- Endorsement of a preferred developer for the Lakes Edge Land Release
- Delivery of a \$23.18 million Capital Works Program
- Installation of solar lighting around Lake Hamilton
- Construction of new cricket nets at Pedrina Park

Council also received audits from the Victorian Auditor-General's Office on both the Financial and Performance Statements, confirming sound governance and responsible financial management.

"We're proud to share a record of strong performance, responsible budgeting and a clear focus on outcomes that benefit our community," Cr Heslin concluded. The 2024–2025 Annual Report is now available on Council's website.

COUNCILS OUTDOOR POOLS PREPARE TO OPENWith November almost here and the weather warming up, it's time to get ready for another outdoor pool season across the Southern Grampians Shire.

Hamilton Outdoor Pool is set to open on 1 November with Balmoral, Coleraine, Dunkeld and Penshurst all following with opening scheduled for 6 December (weather permitting).

Preparation works have been underway for over eight weeks with the team heading into the home stretch of pre-season. Throughout this time, the five Southern Grampians Shire Outdoor Pools have been filled, pumps checked and water quality balanced to meet parameters for opening.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said Council was excited to welcome the community back to its outdoor pools and encouraged residents to support their local pools and lifeguards this summer.

"Our outdoor pools are such an important part of our towns and hold plenty of stories. They're a great way for families and friends to get together outdoors, be in the community, get some sun (safely!) and make some lasting memories together.

"We are pleased to be able offer free entry to all outdoor pools for all residents again this summer, and we encourage everyone to get out and enjoy them."

While the Hamilton Outdoor Pool is almost ready to open, vacuuming of the outer township pools and cleaning of changerooms and kiosks is scheduled across the next six weeks.

This year will also see the introduction of an updated Child Supervision Policy to help keep everyone safe.

Key changes within the Policy include:

- Children aged 11 years and under will require active supervision by a parent or guardian while at the pool (previously under 10 years of age)
- To remain in alignment with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations (GSPO), to ensure safe supervision levels, groups / families will not be permitted entry where the number of Parent / Guardian's supervising a group of children under 10 years exceeds the ratio of 1:4
- Larger informal groups of children arriving at an aquatic facility may also be required to participate in a short safety briefing to the entry policies and may be refused entry

These new guidelines will also make certain that installations are appropriate to their surroundings, are low-maintenance, and are designed to avoid environmental or safety impacts.

Mayor Councillor Dennis Heslin has welcomed the draft policy, saying:

"Now that we have a clear policy to point to, we can ensure that all applicants are on an even playing field. "All new proposals can now be carefully assessed against the policy to make sure that plaques and memorials serve the heritage of our community."

The cost and installation of any new plaque or memorial will be borne by the applicant, while Council oversees installation and compliance.

FRESH NEW LOOK FOR DUNKELD AND PENSHURST TOILETS

Southern Grampians Shire Council is giving two important community facilities a refresh, with upgrade works now underway at the Dunkeld Visitor Information Centre Public Toilets and Penshurst Caravan Park Toilets/Showers.

These upgrades will address deterioration, enhance functionality and improve overall appearance and standard.

The Dunkeld Visitor Information Centre Public Toilets work will refresh internal finishes through the removal of existing linings, installation of vinyl sheeting to floors and walls, a full internal repaint, as well as updated dispensers and signage. The facility will be closed from Monday 27 October to Thursday 18 December 2025.

Recognising the importance of local events scheduled for this time, the Dunkeld Visitor Information Centre Public Toilets will be reopened by the contractor from 7 to 9 November, closing again from 10 November to accommodate the GPT100 Miler. The bathrooms will briefly reopen again on 15 November for the Dunkeld Cup, closing again from 16 November.

The toilets in the Dunkeld Memorial Park across Parker Street will remain open during this period.

The same surface refresh will be delivered at Penshurst, complemented by replacement of the toilets in both male and female amenities, a new urinal in the male amenities, as well as refurbishment of floors and fixings. The facility will be closed from Monday 3 November to Thursday 18 December 2025.

Alternative public toilets can be found at the Penshurst Botanic Gardens adjacent to the swimming pool. Further information will be provided on access to showers for Penshurst Caravan Park visitors.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the upgrades were part of Council's ongoing renewal and investment in community infrastructure. "These improvements will bring a noticeable lift in quality and presentation," Cr Heslin said. "By addressing wear and tear and enhancing the usability of our public amenities, we're making sure they meet the expectations

of both our community and the many visitors who come to enjoy our region."

Council appreciates the community's patience during these works and looks forward to reopening both facilities in time for the busy summer season.



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


What is Bowen Therapy.
