Lest We Forget

The Dunkeld RSL Sub-Branch commemorated Remembrance Day with a service at the cenotaph in the Dunkeld Memorial Park on Friday 11 November 2022. President, Mr Terry Noble, led the community service. Dunkeld Consolidated School Year 6 students and staff were also in attendance. The School Captains participated in the service with Charlotte Alderman reciting The Ode and Ben Peters raising the flag to the mast head during Rouse.



Commemorative wreaths, bouquets and poppies were laid at the base of the Dunkeld Soldiers Memorial, while the hymn *Abide with Me* was played.

Terry Noble reflected on returned service men and women: *For those in whose memory we gather here today, for those who returned home, for those who have lost loved ones and for those who continue to serve, we thank you.*



Australians around the country come together in numbers large and small – in cities and country towns we pause to remember those who put their lives on the line so we can enjoy the opportunities we have today.

I would like to talk this morning about the men and women who have returned home and those still to return, we should take a moment to think why so many of those young brave men and women have such difficulty adjusting to everyday life and why so many take their life, it is due to what they have endured through the brutality of war.

Just this year alone, more military personnel and veterans have died by their own hand on our soil, than when away, and we understand that many who return don't leave the battlefield behind.

Our defence members must become our cause. These past, present and future members while serving, and on return, need the country's thoughts and guidance, this morning they are in our thoughts as we pay tribute to them at this monument.

We know about the traumatic symptoms and death our defence members experience, and what they return with, and it has been called many things ... such as Soldier's Heart, Hysteria and even Nostalgia.

It was known as shell shock in World War I and Combat Fatigue in World War II and Korea. And no-one will know for sure the number of suicides of those who returned home from these conflicts. And yes, they are fortunate to have returned home, but we should remember the ongoing help we can offer these brave men and women in their sometimes difficult times.



This war memorial is more than just a historical record of past deeds. It is correctly and increasingly a place that does and always will explain our current military involvement and it is also a place of history and remembrance.

At services like these we repeat the words, Lest we forget, we should never forget, we will not forget, but let us remember our obligations to those who served, to those who returned home with broken bodies and minds.

The DPA AGM was conducted on 7 November 2022 and the following Office Bearers were elected unopposed:

President: Peter Gilbert

Vice President: Annette Jones

The DPA General Meeting was then held with the following community issues and concerns raised and discussed:

- DPA jointly with SGSC are conducting a campaign to lobby VicRoads to reduce the main area of Parker Street to a 40km zone. A sub-committee has been formed which will have a three-pronged strategy:
 - collecting data (including SGSC road counting equipment).
 - providing anecdotal and video footage from local businesses.
 - enlisting community support to provide information on accidents, near misses or danger to pedestrians.

If anyone has any information, suggestions, photos or videos they wish to share on this issue please email or contact DPA.

- The sub-committee working on the provision of a toilet at the Arboretum are making steady progress.
- Dunkeld Tourism Association has been actively seeking improvement at the Piccaninny/Bainggug and Mount Sturgeon/Wurgarri car parks from Parks Victoria for five years. Next will be contact with the State Minister.
- DPA meeting will be held every two months in 2023 however the Executive will continue to meet monthly.
- The Dunkeld Visitor Centre will be completed by May 2023. The Evie EV charging stations should be relocated to either Wills Street or Sterling Place carpark.
- Dunkeld Writers' Festival will again be held in August 2023.
- The new community enterprise, The Old Bus Depot, opened on 29 October with great success. Visitors were a mix of locals and tourists from around Australia and overseas.
- **Next Meeting will be held on Monday 5 December at 7.30pm - Sterling Place, Dunkeld.**

The interconnectivity of us all

Today's story begins on 8 August, 36,000 feet above planet earth, on a plane somewhere over Europe, when someone suddenly falls seriously ill.

The pilot is forced to touch down at the nearest airport and the patient together with their family is transferred to the nearest hospital. Hundreds of people on that plane have their travel plans disrupted. Connecting flights are missed and frantic phone calls are made. Some people get sad and some get mad. None are glad.

But our story does not end at the help desk in a foreign country in Europe. The consequences of this mishap are felt all over the world, even here in Hamilton. Let me explain. The plane that had to touch down was on its way to Melbourne to be refuelled and refreshed with those little itty bitty pillows and hygienically sealed blankets. This plane was then supposed to take Jeanine and I onto Los Angeles which of course it didn't, or rather couldn't. Our flight is delayed by 24 hours and there is nothing anyone can do. So, we too are a little sad and mad. Then we get in touch with our daughter in New York and the tentacles of melancholy spread around the world with the speed of the internet.

Our biff is not with the airline, our concern is for the patient and their family. The lesson we re-learned is the interconnectivity of us all. We might like to pretend that we are on our own untouchable little island, but we are connected in ways that we do not realise or comprehend. We therefore must go gently and tread lightly. Be patient with the staff on the other side of the help desk and with each other, for we are more interconnected than we first thought.

October 2022 Victorian Floods Business Farmer Support

A support package is available for flood affected farmers:

Primary Producer Recovery Grants: Up to \$75,000 grants to cover the cost of recovery and get businesses up and running again. Note: This replaces the \$10,000 Primary Producer Flood Clean Up, Relief Grants announced on 19 October. Producers that have received a Primary Producer

Flood Relief Clean Up Grant of \$10,000 can now apply for up to a further \$65,000 under the Primary Producer Recover Grant, bringing the total to \$75,000.

Rural Landholder Grants: Up to \$25,000 grants to cover the costs of disaster impacts for small scale producers.

Primary Producer Concessional Loans: Up to \$250,000 to restore or replace damaged equipment and infrastructure, or to cover the short-term business expenses.

Primary Producer Transport Subsidies: Up to \$15,000 to support the transport of emergency fodder or stock drinking water, and the movement of livestock.

Business and Community Sports Flood Recovery Grants

Grants of up to \$50,000 are now available to eligible businesses and community sports organisations in flood affected areas.

The Business and Community Sport Flood Recovery Grants will help cover eligible expenses arising from direct damage due to floods. Businesses and organisations must be located within a local government area deemed eligible for assistance under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangement.

The new recovery support package is jointly funded by the Commonwealth and Victorian Governments. It provides further support for businesses and organisations with direct damage to property, assets, stock or equipment due to the 2022 Victorian floods.

Immediate Flood Relief Grant

Businesses directly impacted by the Victorian floods that commenced in October 2022 can access a one-off grant of \$5,000 to cover immediate expenses. Businesses must be located within an eligible local government area and incur significant direct damage to their place of business, business assets, stock or equipment.

Community Sport Emergency Flood Assistance Program

Grants of \$5,000 are available to Victorian sport and active recreation organisations directly affected by the October 2022 Victorian floods.

Wonders of Spring

Last weekend I decided to take the plunge and walk the bitumen roads to see the River Wannon where it flows under North Boundary Road. I don't really like walking on bitumen and find it rather boring compared with a walk in the bush which offers so many species to appreciate.

I am always being shown how mistaken I am. Both sides of the Old Ararat Road were absolutely festooned in native Australian flowers and grasses. I was so surprised, pleasantly so. I have never seen such a show of flowers since I have lived in Dunkeld; swathes of beautiful yellow Bulbine Lilies, *Bulbine bulbosa*, usually accompanied by swathes of the lovely, fragrant, purple Chocolate Lilies, *Arthropodium strictum*, some as high as my waist, covered in flowers. Walking in the bush, I've never come across so many, not so lushly distributed, lovely remnants of the Western Victoria Plains. Perhaps it is on account of the very wet weather and the soils too wet to be mown; whatever the reason, the whole walk along the road was spectacular.

Although the dominant species, these were by no means the only flowers in bloom. Nestling beside some of the Chocolate Lilies were colonies of Milkmaids, *Burchardia umbellata*, their white petals a backdrop for their deep maroon anthers.

Tall Spear Grasses, a *Stipa* species, gently swayed their bowed heads, their pale green and dusky red awns splintering the sunlight. At a lower level, small Wallaby grasses captured the light with their fluffy, silvery green awns.

Beside one patch of Bulbine and Chocolate Lilies, Common Pimeleas, *Pimelea humilis*, grow humbly at their feet, displaying their creamy-white clusters of flowers. In a more open area was a mass of flowering Common Everlastings, *Helichrysum apiculatum*, with their clusters of deep yellow flowers held on silvery-grey stems.

On the return journey I explored the western side of the road, carefully avoiding the many flooded areas. Here too, Bulbine and Chocolate Lilies abounded. In places where the vegetation was not so lanky, I was delighted to find little, bluish-mauve Slender Sun Orchids, *Thelymitra pauciflora*. Evidently they only open on hot, humid days, which the day certainly was. Here also I discovered a few Onion Orchids, *Microtis unifolia*. I looked carefully at the base to confirm they were not the introduced African Onion Orchid with several leaves, which is invading the countryside.

In this lower floral environment grow *Leptorhynchos tenuifolius*, Wing Buttons, holding their dense yellow buttons on tall wiry stems. They resemble Scaly Buttons, *Leptorhynchos squamatus*, but prefer moist conditions.

As I was looking at these, my eyes glimpsed a deep bluish-purple, lily-like flower with bright yellow anthers. It grew from dark green, basal, grass-like leaves, some of which stood upright and some of which sprawled on the earth. From them emerged multiple flower stems bearing many buds. This attractive flower is the Blue Grass Lily, *Caesia calliantha*, which I have long waited to get to know.

Not far away was a pale-yellow flower, its petals curved and showing pale maroon markings. It was the delicate Spur Velleia, *Velleia paradoxa*, a member of the Goodeniaceae family.

Where the surface was more open, hundreds of tiny Droseras, their sticky leaves sparkling in the sun, cover the soil. Weaving amongst them were the pretty, pink funnel-like flowers of the native Pink Bindweed, *Convolvulus erubescens*. Also, a ground cover of what may be soft Crane's-bill, *Geranium potentilloides*, was profuse in this area, enjoying the moist soil. It had tiny mauvish-white flowers and deeply lobed leaves which were hairy on the back. Its pale stems were also hairy.

How important the roadside verges are in conserving and propagating our native flora, which is disappearing so rapidly! Equally, how important it is for us to be aware of its existence and to honour it and its part in the circle of life.

I probably won't write another article this year, so I take this opportunity of thanking everyone for their gifts to community and I wish you all a Peaceful, Happy and Healthy Christmas and coming year.
