#### **RED CROSS NEWS**

We acknowledge the immense work being done by Red Cross in war ravaged Gaza and hope for their safety in such dangerous conditions.

New Trauma Teddy knitters are being sought to take up the task and Sally Beggs has the standard pattern on hand. A Teddy Bear's picnic was held in Beechworth to celebrate the 35th birthday of the Trauma Teddy concept. Young and old alike treasure Teddy and aged care residents love them.

Nareeb Nareeb Dunkeld and Brit Brit catered for the Zone Meeting in Hamilton last week. Mobilization Team members Natalie Motee and Anna Wilson gave a positive update on the work of Red Cross groups across the state. They were happy to take back with them the latest collection of used stamps and described the meticulous sorting and cataloguing done by two volunteers every Wednesday. Visitors, buyers and collectors are welcome on those days. After 10 years as Zone rep, Joy Savill has resigned and Lyn Iredell from Brit Brit, has taken on the task. Any ideas we have for Red Cross, can be passed on to Lyn and she will take them to the state meetings in Melbourne.

In February, Doug Robertson will speak in Coleraine on the famous Helena Rubenstein, whose life began in Coleraine. This year, \$330,000 have been raised for Red Cross in Victoria. Now that Head Quarters have moved to Southbank, all sections of the organization are being brought together, after many years of separation. These include Emergency Services; Patient Transport; Retail; Volunteers; Migration services etc. In Victoria, the idea is being formed of having clusters in the regions, so as to reduce the amount of travel for members and reps. for Zone Meetings.

Frankie Beggs gave the Overseas Support Group report, and that new ways to raise money are being sought, as some fundraisers have been lost. Emergency services were on hand during the Porepunkah tragedy and have been active with drought support.

#### 300 Words from Father David

#### The question I fear most.

I often find myself asking the Almighty lots of questions. Understandable, inquisitive things like ... What were you

thinking when you created tarantulas? How come we seem to be biased towards doing naughty things even though we know that there are fearsome consequences. Why is it so much easier to start a war than it is to finish it? I discover no clear cut, well-reasoned answers, which arrive with thunder and lighting, but rather in my dotage I find myself just sitting gently trying to find the answer from within. Like reliable tradies, outside external messenger, angel, seraphim and posties are a rare commodity.

But often it occurs to me that perhaps The Master might have some questions of me, particularly at the end of my life when I know I must give an account of my good things as well as my villainous acts.

I don't think The Almighty will ask me for references from 3 reliable witnesses, preferably one from my bishop. No, I think this will be a direct line of questioning just Him and me. Is it not possible that he might ask me 'What in my name were you thinking when you.... here insert one of my many disappointments....?'

But it is not this particular line of questioning that I fear the most, excruciating and understandable as it might be. The question that will make me squirm and writhe is this. 'What did you contribute?' We are given so much and so many chances to share our wealth, energy, talents, compassion, understanding and nourishment with others and to our collective community as a whole. On a daily basis the opportunities are there for the celebrating. I know that I have been given so very much by so many, now it's my turn to do the giving.

#### Where to buy 2 kilos of anger.

It was one of many conversations that I enjoyed in this interconnected community.

The person ahead of me in the aisle spotted my collar and proceeded to tell me with great vigour about an article they had read in a newspaper. Based on the two sentences they quoted from the article I understood why they felt so strongly. Given the effect that it had had on this person's blood pressure and with the wise voice of my doctor and the word hypertension echoing faintly in my mind, I chose not to follow up on the article.

Understandably, my friend was looking for an agreeable advocate in their line of questioning but as I had not seen the article I had to politely decline. It would be churlish of me to comment on something I had not read and did not understand. I would be casting rocky aspersions in ignorance.

Part of the dilemma is the brevity of time and space that our friends in the media have to dispense complex concepts in bite sized, easily digestible morsels for our consumption. It can't be easy. At least the scores in the footy are accurate and indisputable even if the process of getting the score on the board was fraught with danger, knocks and bruises.

The other thing that perturbs me is that the front page with its BOLD headline is often crafted to incite anger and or fear. I know where to go to purchase a kilo of grumpiness. It might be good for sales and the pharmaceutical company that dispenses my blood pressure tablets, but it doesn't always make for congeniality and laughter which are gifts that we all crave.

Ultimately I look forward to many happy conversations in this splendid, connected community of ours.

#### Actually ... it's complicated

We tend to think of Christmass as straightforward, easy and uncomplicated. Baby in the manger, Peace on earth and good will to all. But by the time you scratch away the manky, pooey straw, shush the braying animals, make the bewildered Carpenter a cuppa and mop Mother Mary's brow, you realise actually... Christmass is complicated. God consciously chose to be born into the murky complexity of our grubbiness. Thank Goodness, for we always find ourselves being biased and tempted towards the dark side. The wrong things always look sparkling and glamourous. Thankfully The Master is born into our yuk, and there he loves us, rejoices with us, rejoices in us.

And in more good news he chooses you and I, that are not at all spectacular or ritzy. He will even use an old gnarly carpenter and a teenage peasant lass to knock on the door of our hardened hearts.

He is a God that comes in the unexpected, who surprises us, makes us feel embarrassed and flusters us. We are boggled because he comes and wants to live with us.

#### A Christmas treat for Dunkeld – again!

This Christmas, for the third year running, Dunkeld will host the internationally renowned Australian Chamber Choir, with a concert that demonstrates how composers through the ages have produced some of their liveliest music for the Christmas season.

As a tribute to the late satirist Michael Leunig, the program will feature three of his short Christmas poems, set to music by Australian composer, Christopher Willcock. In this and other works on the program, the choir is accompanied by Katia Mestrovic on harp.

The centrepiece of the program is perhaps the most theatrical of Johann Sebastian Bach's Motets, *Jesu Meine Freude*.

These works are punctuated by well-known Christmas melodies, such as *In Dulci Jubilo* (by JS Bach), *Resonet in Laudibus* and *Es istein Ros entsprungen* (by Michael Praetorius).

The choir will also perform music that has never been heard live in Australia, despite being composed over four hundred years ago. Raffaella Aleotti, music director at the convent of San Vito in Ferrara, was the first woman ever to publish a collection of sacred music, in Venice in 1593. From this collection, the Dunkeld audience will be treated to the Australian premiere of *And there was with the angel*.

This concert will provide a refuge from the frenetic festive season, with music steeped in the essence of Christmas – peace, joy and goodwill.

# Garden Notes - December

Main vegetable plantings for December are broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, early brussels sprouts, lettuce, beans, carrots, parsnips, beetroot, radish and turnips.

Flowering annuals include petunia, marigolds, impatiens, portulaca, and salvia.

Watering is probably one of the least understood aspects of gardening even by experienced gardeners. Firstly, people relying on dam or bore water should make themselves aware of the salt content. If it is 500ppm or less then it is safe for most plants, some very hardy plants can tolerate up to 1500ppm as long as care is taken not to splash it on to plant foliage. One easy test is if your water is drinkable then it is safe to use on your garden.

For established plants, a deep soaking say once or twice per week is much better than a quick splash every day as this will encourage roots to "chase" water deeper into the soil therefore establishing a deeper and stronger root system which will be more drought tolerant. Young seedlings or newly planted plants will require more frequent watering, on hot days perhaps three or four times. Try to avoid using fine sprinklers in windy conditions as much water will be lost, also if your hose has been lying in the open on a hot day, be sure to "run off" any hot water before applying it to your plants. Mulching and regular weed control will significantly reduce water use. To avoid the establishment of fungus disease problems some plants should not be watered overhead, examples are roses, tomatoes and the pumpkin/cucumber group. As long as you only use natural soaps and detergents, "grey water" i.e. bath or shower water is safe to use on your garden. The best times of the day to water are early morning or evening as this is when evaporation is reduced, however, newly sown seed or newly planted seedlings will need water during the day.

Your soil type will also determine how much water your garden needs. Sandy soils will dry out much faster than heavier or clay type soils. This is because a clay soil with its much smaller particle size has many more soil "pores" in which to store water therefore a given volume of clay soil will hold more water than the same volume of sandy soil, an advantage in summer but the opposite can apply during a wet winter.

Now that your roses have nearly finished their main spring flush of growth and flowering, you should spend some time "dead heading" them, i.e. removing spent flowers by cutting down to a healthy leaf junction. This will ensure plenty of new growth for good summer and autumn flowers.

As weather warms up and dries out, slugs and snails become less of a problem, however earwigs can begin to appear. The main ways to control them are to remove any cover for them e.g. weeds. piles of timber or rubbish, paling fences and timber or stone garden edges are also popular hiding places. Carbaryl can be used, boiling water into hiding places is effective as are traps baited with any type of cooking oil.

Don't forget to check your nursery for a range of Christmas gifts.

The RAANC also adopted a corps emblem of a lamp on a red background. The lamp is a longstanding symbol of military nursing. It dates back to Florence Nightingale, who was called the 'Lady with the Lamp' during the Crimean War in the 1850s.

Since 1951, RAANC members have served in conflict zones and peace operations around the world, including:

- Korea
- Malaya (Malaysia)
- Vietnam
- Cambodia
- Rwanda
- Bougainville
- East Timor (Timor Leste)
- Afghanistan
- Iraq.

## DATE SET FOR DEMOLITION WORKS ON LONSDALE STREET

Demolition at 90-92 Lonsdale Street Hamilton will move ahead with works set to commence 27 January 2026. This marks a major milestone in the ongoing revitalisation of the Hamilton CBD.

Warrnambool-based contractor Murrihy Demolitions will complete demolition works, which will prepare the site for the new Hamilton Library, Digital Hub and Government offices.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin acknowledged the patience shown by the community throughout delays to the site.

"Thank you to everyone for your understanding while we have worked through the necessary planning and legal processes in readying the Lonsdale Street site for demolition," Cr Heslin said.

"Projects of this scale take careful planning and coordination, and we want the community to feel confident that every stage has been, and will continue to be, completed with community front of mind.

"These buildings have been a part of Hamilton for a long time, and now they will make way for a completely reimagined CBD precinct. The new library, digital hub and government offices will transform the look and feel of the area and modernise the space. We're really excited to show everyone what's to come."

The project will involve the complete demolition of existing structures including the former Toyworld and Mitre 10 buildings, as well as EPA approved asbestos removal, waste management and the eventual levelling of the site. Materials will be disposed of safely, with all relevant certificates provided to Council.

To protect nearby properties, demolition along shared boundaries will be completed by hand, with contractors to carry out roof protection works where needed.

Neighbouring businesses will be kept informed ahead of any temporary service interruptions.

The demolition will be broken down into six carefully planned stages over approximately six weeks. This is designed to minimise disruptions as much as possible. Fencing will be erected at the site from Friday 5 December 2025, with the demolition beginning on Tuesday 27 January 2026.

Council and Murrihy Demolitions will work closely with those in neighbouring properties to accommodate deliveries and access needs during demolition periods. Community safety remains the highest priority. The site will be fully fenced and signed, with traffic management in place during short closure periods. Dust suppression, noise minimisation and continuous waste removal will ensure the project is completed with care for both the environment and the surrounding precinct. "We understand that demolition works can be

inconvenient, and we appreciate the patience of those who work nearby," said Cr Heslin.

"This project is a very important investment in the future of our town, and your cooperation will help us to manage that as smoothly and safely as possible." ## IMPROVED SAFETY AT HAMILTON LAKES EDGE PLAYGROUND

Hamilton's beloved Lakes Edge Playground is set for an upgrade that will provide a more welcoming and inclusive space for children and their families of all abilities.

Council has begun installation of new fencing and entry gates to fully enclose the playground, creating a space where children can play freely while parents and carers can watch and participate with greater peace of mind.

The upgrade follows a budget submission received during the 2024–25 Budget Submission process, where parents and playground users highlighted that user experience would be improved by enclosing the playground. The submission explained that it would also provide a more inclusive space for people with additional needs and their carers.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the project shows how community input can directly shape local investment.

"This upgrade came straight from the families who use the playground every day," Cr Heslin said.

"Last year we asked the community what they wanted to see in the budget, and projects like the Lake Hamilton solar lights, the Pedrina Park cricket nets and now this playground fencing all came from that process.

"Budget submissions are open again until Friday 9 January, so if you have an idea for how Council should allocate budget, please head to the 'engage with us' section of the Council website, we'd love to hear from you."

The new fencing will match the existing style, with timber posts and powder-coated steel panels designed with vertical bars spaced to reduce entrapment risks and comply with recognised Australian Standards for playground safety.

Three new pedestrian gates will also be installed. These will be DDA-compliant, self-closing and fitted with child-safe latches to ensure safe and easy access for all users, including pram-users and people with mobility aids. The work will be delivered by Warrnambool-based contractor Doukas Group, with construction having begun on Tuesday 2 December and expected to be completed by Monday 15 December 2025.

Disruptions will be minimal, with the playground expected to remain open throughout majority of the works period. Please take care around the work zone and follow all safety signage.




