We gave flowers to Mrs Higgins. We had people come in our classroom. Sailor Grimmer.

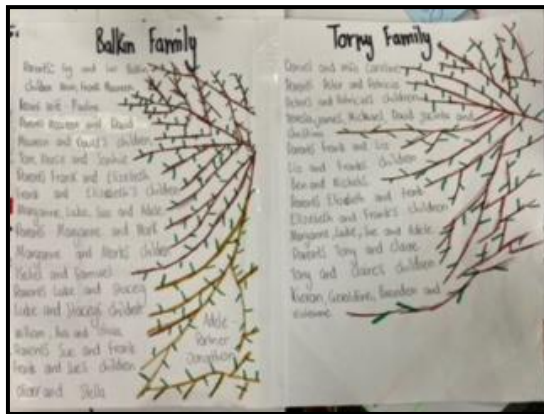

SOMERS CAMP



These Year 5 and 6 children: Sean Bird, Drew Hassett, Louis Lazzari, Oscar Fanning, Maxi Graham, Jack Reynolds, Claudia Cochran, Heidi and Penny Burger, Ella Peters and Edie Jackson are extremely fortunate to be attending the educational (some might say a chance of a lifetime) Somers School Camp.

The Somers School Camp site has not always been used for children's camps.

The original camp buildings were erected in the 1940's on land purchased under the National Royal Australian Air Force. Many Victorian airmen passed through the camp during the war years.

After the war in 1947, the camp was bought by a private group who made extensive alterations and for some time ran as a private holiday resort called 'Future Holidays'.

The Commonwealth Government re-acquired the land to cope with the growing influx of migrants after the war. When no longer needed as a migrant camp it was purchased by the Education Department and altered by the Public Works Department to the requirements of a school camp. In September 1959 the first camp occurred with the entry of 100 boys from the St Kilda.

The camps alternated boy's camps and girls camps until August of 1976 when four new purpose built dormitory blocks were erected, which replaced all the sleeping huts. This enabled the camps to become co-educational with 80 boys and 80 girls attending at the same time.

Over many years the camp has continued to be updated with additions such as an exciting Environmental Studies/Art complex, an indoor Rock Climbing Centre, a new double Flying Fox, Challenge Swing and a range of other high quality outdoor adventure activities.

Children's experiences continue with Kitchen Garden, ES Lessons, Best Hut, Bush Craft, The Barn and Assemblies. Night entertainment consists of games, hikes through the bushlands with the opportunity of encountering wildlife. Bush dancing can be enjoyed along with Concert Night, Tabloid Sports, disco and campfire nights.

What a delightful way of making new friends and getting to know your group. We are sure our students will make many new friends and share in a unique experience.

BATTERY FUNDRAISER REMINDER

The Dunkeld Consolidated School wants your Used Batteries!

The Dunkeld Consolidated School Council has been conducting an ongoing Battery Collection Fundraiser.

Kelly's Dunkeld have kindly offered to be a central collection point for used batteries for the Dunkeld Consolidated School (Jason Linskens was instrumental in organising this). Any unwanted car, truck, tractor, boat batteries etc may be dropped off at Kelly's Hardware Store, 101 Parker Street, Dunkeld.

Components of used batteries e.g. metals, acids and plastics are reclaimed, recycled and put back into the manufacturing process to build more batteries and household products, 98% of the battery is recycled.
