RESTRICTIONS**


REGIONAL VICTORIA RESTRICTIONS EASE FROM 11.59pm ON 10 JUNE 2021


 Two adult visitors permitted in the home per day. Dependants of visiting adults excluded from cap.


 Masks must be worn indoors, except at home or for those with exemptions, and outdoors where physical distancing cannot be maintained.

 Outdoor public gatherings limited to 20 people.

 Indoor sport and recreation open (including gyms and dance schools), play centres etc, max capacity indoors 50 people, total venue 150 and maximum group size 10 people.


 Outdoor community sport permitted for all ages, training and competition (cannot travel to Melbourne), maximum group size 20, maximum venue capacity 150, 50 indoors. No venue limit if 100 metres distance can be maintained between groups (e.g. golf).


 Hospitality open for seated service, patron cap of 150, only 75 indoors, group size of 10, density quotients apply.


 Religious ceremonies up to 150 people, with no more than 75 indoors.

 Funerals up to 75 people indoor and outdoor.

 Weddings capped at 20 people.

 Hairdressing, beauty and personal services open - can remove masks for services, density quotients apply.

 Community facilities open, density quotients, maximum 75 indoors, 10 person group limit.

 Entertainment and leisure, largely open with capacity limits and density quotients. Creative studios open to capacity of 75 indoors.

 Accommodation open for single households, plus two adults and their dependants.

 Hospital and care facility visitors only allowed for end-of-life reasons, birth partners and parents of children.

The turning of the leaves has reminded me of a good friend, Basil. He lived a long time ago in a different place. Whenever I went to see him I knew I was in for a scintillating conversation, peppered with laughter, wisdom and insights. There was also the gift of silence when we said nothing and let the silence say it for us.

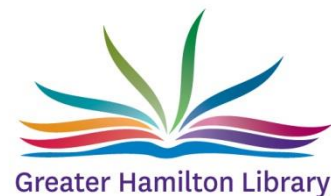
From his nursing home room Basil could see a fountain, a bit of courtyard, some lawn and a stunning claret ash tree. I remember vividly going one autumn day to see him. The wind had that decided edge to it, the sky was crystal blue and the leaves had turned that spectacular deep, sumptuous red. For a while we chattered away and on this particular day, Basil's insights were a prickly balm that made you stand on your head and take notice. The irony was that Basil wasn't as sharp as he used to be. The years had worn his body down and the words took a little while to tumble out, but when they did ... they were valuable words.

I marvelled at what he said. The sort of wisdom that only someone who is senior in years could offer. Basil was someone who could look back with hindsight and see the big picture, a view from the hill if you like.

For an indeterminate amount of time we just looked in silence at the miracle of nature in the claret ash tree. The space in our conversation was filled with unspeakable light.

I came away humbled and blessed by the encounter. I couldn't help thinking how marvellous it was that in the autumn of his life, Basil was in some ways, his most magnificent. As I approach my autumnal time, my hope is that I too might become another 'Basil'.

DUNKELD PUBLIC LANDS COMMITTEE

The weeds on the dam wall have been cut and sprayed and will get another spray next week weather permitting. The Shire will be inspecting the section of the walking track between the dam wall and Henty Street to see what restoration work can be done. It has been suggested to decommission the section of Macarthur Street across the dam wall and make it a walking path only. Any feedback most welcome.

There has been a start on the jetty so we should see the results in a few weeks hopefully weather permitting.

A thank you to Paul McDonald for the use of his semi-trailer to transport the footbridge out from Hamilton.

We are applying for a toilet facilities grant and if successful to be located near the Sawmill. The volunteers at the sawmill are doing a fantastic job cutting boards for the jetty deck boardwalk and also for the foot bridge near Adams Street. Thank you.

A new footbridge will be installed across the creek in the caravan park in the coming weeks, also a new gas BBQ with auto cut-off push button type to make it safer to use. Some drainage works will also commence in the near future as well.

Today's story begins in Central Park, New York. Central Park is really BIG. Like, it has its own zoo!

My informant was ambling through when they came across a turtle. Not so unusual, but the odd thing was that this turtle was a long way from where it should have been.

Sadly, it was going the wrong way and trying valiantly to climb some steps which was a futile and misguided endeavour.

The passer-by watched the struggle for some time, not really quite knowing what should be done. They weren't a qualified vet and the turtle wasn't exactly forthcoming with a home address or a mobile phone number. Started twenty years ago for those returned from Vietnam, the Heart Health Program is free and now open to all returned veterans and peacekeepers with overseas operational service who have not previously done the Heart Health Program before. Individual Heart Health Program: How it works
Each participant receives twelve months of healthy lifestyle coaching from a highly qualified and dedicated allied health professional via fortnightly health coaching calls with information and advice tailored to each individuals health and fitness goals. Visitors to school

Limit school access to outside visitors where possible

Schools should continue to limit non-essential visitors to school premises, however local discretion can apply for some activities (e.g. provision of MARC or MACC services).

Visitors to school grounds must comply with physical distancing and face mask requirements set, and practise good hand hygiene.

To support contact tracing, schools must keep a record of all staff, students and visitors who attend on-site. Schools must record the full name, contact details, date, and time of attendance at school, as well as the areas of the school that the person attended. Our school has a QR code on the front door of the school for anyone needing to enter to go to the front office only. A sign in book is available for those without a mobile device.

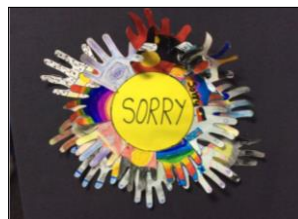
